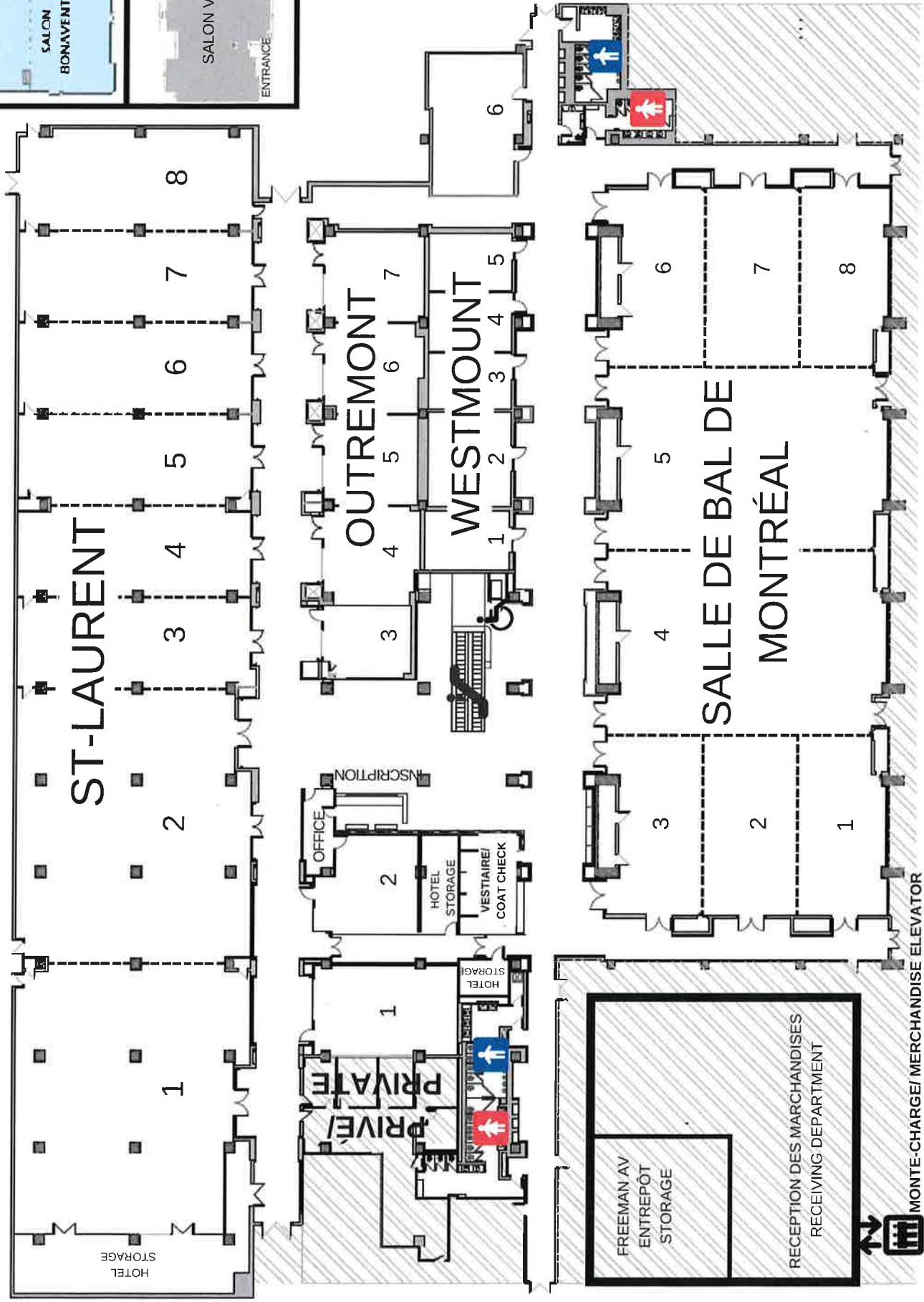

Dear NPSA Participants:

Welcome to the 2018 meeting of the Northeastern Political Science Association. As we gather just days after one of the most contested and polarized mid-term elections, we are still contemplating the meaning of the results, how they will impact the Trump Presidency and what it all portends for the future of American politics. We are doing this from Montreal, 60 miles from the U.S. border as we celebrate the 50th Annual Meeting of the Northeastern Political Science Association.

As this is the 50th Annual Meeting, our theme is “50 Years of Change.” Many of the papers and roundtables will focus on events, trends, and crises that have shaped the world during the mid-century existence of NPSA. What is different today from 50 years ago? Which conditions facilitated these transformations and what are the implications of these changes? What has not changed and why? This theme encompasses all political science subfields and encourages participants to think broadly and creatively about their areas of interest and research. We hope that you will consider this theme, not only at our meeting, but in your future scholarship and teaching.

Program Chair Farida Jalalzai and the program committee have organized a conference with over 140 panels. There are traditional panels, roundtables, and programs focused on professional development.

The NPSA will also be presenting a number of speakers during the meeting. APSA President Rogers Smith will be speaking at our Thursday afternoon reception.

In honor of our 50th meeting we have chosen to meet in Montreal, the largest city in Quebec and the second largest city in Canada. It is the second-largest primarily French-speaking city in the world, after Paris. In 2017, Montreal was ranked the 12th most livable city in the world by the *Economist Intelligence Unit*, and the best city in the world to be a university student in the *QS World University Rankings*. It is also the home of great cultural institutions, historical sites, and restaurants that make this one of the most exciting cities in the world. We hope that you will have the opportunity to spend some time outside the meeting.

Thank you for attending the 2018 meeting. We hope you enjoy the meeting and we look forward to seeing you next year, for our 51st Annual Meeting in Philadelphia.



Chers participants au NPSA:

Bienvenue à la réunion de 2018 de la Northeastern Political Science Association. Comme nous Réunis quelques jours après l'une des élections de mi-mandat les plus contestées et les plus polarisées, nous réfléchissons toujours à la signification des résultats, à leur impact sur la présidence Trump et aux perspectives d'avenir de la politique américaine. APSA Presidential Address/ Discours présidentiel de l'APSA

Rogers Smith

University of Pennsylvania
APSA President, 2018-2019

Rogers M. Smith is the Christopher H. Browne Distinguished Professor of Political Science at the University of Pennsylvania. He is the author or co-author of many articles and seven books, including *Political Peoplehood* (2015), *Still a House Divided: Race and Politics in Obama's America* with Desmond S. King (2011), *Stories of Peoplehood: The Politics and Morals of Political Membership* (2003), and *Civic Ideals: Conflicting Visions of Citizenship in U.S. History* (1997). *Civic Ideals* received six best book prizes from four professional associations and was a finalist for the 1998 Pulitzer Prize in History. Smith was elected a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2004, the American Academy of Political and Social Science in 2011, and the American Philosophical Society in 2016. He is currently President of the American Political Science Association.

Rogers M. Smith est le professeur émérite de sciences politiques Christopher H. Browne à l'Université de Pennsylvanie. Il est l'auteur ou le co-auteur de nombreux articles et sept livres, dont *Political Peoplehood* (2015), *Still a House Divided: La race et la politique dans l'Amérique d'Obama* avec Desmond S. King (2011), *Histoires de la personnalité: politique et morale. de l'adhésion politique* (2003) et *des idéaux civiques: visions contradictoires de la citoyenneté dans l'histoire des États-Unis* (1997). *Civic Ideals* a reçu six meilleurs prix de livres de quatre associations professionnelles et a été finaliste du prix Pulitzer 1998 en histoire. Smith a été élu membre de l'Académie américaine des arts et des sciences en 2004, de l'Académie américaine des sciences politiques et sociales en 2011 et de l'American Philosophical Society en 2016. Il est actuellement président de l'American Political Science Association.
