Dear NPSA Participants:

Welcome to the 2023 meeting of the Northeastern Political Science Association.

We gather during an unprecedented time in our nation's history. A former President of the United States faces criminal charges in four different jurisdictions. This same individual is the frontrunner for his party's 2024 presidential nomination as he seeks to duplicate Grover Cleveland's feat of returning to office after losing his reelection campaign.

At the same time, the incumbent President faces challenges of his own. There are those in his party, although few will say publicly, that wish he would retire rather than seek a second term. His son's legal problems threaten to ensnare him as his political opponents will no doubt use this against him during the campaign or perhaps even use them as a basis for impeachment.

We are holding this meeting in Boston, a city known as "the cradle of liberty," at a time when many Americans seem to no longer believe in the democratic process. Rather than accept defeat, some of our fellow citizens continue to assert baseless claims of stolen elections, refusing to accept the outcome. The events of January 6, 2021, demonstrate that American can no longer claim that the peaceful transfer of power is a sure thing.

Many of the papers and roundtables will focus on events, trends, and crises that shape the contemporary world. President Biden has said, "the pandemic is over." However, 500 Americans are still dying each day, and many of our fellow citizens suffer from "long COVID." The continued lack of consensus on COVID can also be found in many of our political challenges today, and a number of these issues will be discussed during our meeting.

Program Chair Yunus Sozen and the program committee have organized a conference with more than 90 panels. There are traditional panels, roundtables, and programs focused on professional development.

The NPSA will also be presenting several speakers during the meeting. APSA President Mark E. Warren will be speaking at our Thursday afternoon luncheon. Our Pi Sigma Alpha speaker will be Thomas E. Patterson, of Harvard University.

For our 55th meeting we are returning to the Parker House, which first hosted our meeting in 2002. The hotel was opened by Harvey D. Parker in 1855, and is the longest continuously operating hotel in the United States. The Boston cream pie and Parker House roll were created in the Hotel's kitchen, and Ho Chi Minh worked as a baker there from 1911 to 1913. Malcolm X, then known as Malcolm Little, was a busboy at the Hotel during the 1940s, and Emeril Lagasse was a sous-chef at the Parker House in the late 1970s and early 1980s.

Boston is home to great cultural institutions, historical sites, and restaurants that make this one of the most exciting cities in the world. We hope that you will have the opportunity to spend some time outside the meeting.

Thank you for attending the 2023 meeting. We hope you enjoy the meeting and we look forward to seeing you next year, for our 56th Annual Meeting, back here at the Parker House.

Anti-Harassment Policy & Professional Code of Conduct

The NPSA prides itself on fostering a professional, inclusive, and amicable annual conference. Our meeting is convened for the purposes of professional development, scholarship, and educational interchange in a spirit of academic freedom and free inquiry. Harassment and unprofessional behavior directed at colleagues, students, or other conference attendees at NPSA meetings are serious forms of professional misconduct.

This Anti-Harassment Policy and Professional Code of Conduct outlines expectations for all participants at NPSA annual meetings. These guidelines and procedures closely model those that govern the American Political Science Association and other regional political science association meetings. These guidelines remind us that our association and our annual meeting are governed by professional academic ethics and norms that apply as standards of behavior and interaction at our meetings.

Purpose

The NPSA is committed to providing a safe, inclusive, respectful, and welcoming conference environment for all participants, regardless of actual or perceived gender, gender identity, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, ability, socioeconomic status, age, religion, or belief. "Participant" in this policy refers to anyone present at NPSA meetings, including staff, contractors, vendors, exhibitors, venue staff, NPSA members, and all other attendees.

Expected Behavior

All participants at NPSA annual meetings are expected to abide by this Anti-Harassment Policy and Professional Code of Conduct in all meeting venues, including official and unofficial social gatherings. All participants are expected to comply by:

- Abiding by the norms of professional respect that are required for free academic interchange.
- Being proactive in helping to mitigate or avoid harm in situations of potential harm to conference participants.
- Agreeing to alert relevant NPSA staff or security personnel if a situation arises in which an individual may be in imminent danger.

Unacceptable Behavior

Behaviors that violate the Anti-Harassment Policy and NPSA Code of Conduct include, but are not limited to:

- Sustained, unprofessional disruption of talks or other events.
- Threats or actions that cause or threaten personal harm.
- Threats or actions that cause or threaten professional harm, punishment or retaliation.
- Intimidating, harassing, abusive, derogatory, or demeaning speech or action.
- Prejudicial actions or comments that coerce others, foment broad hostility or otherwise undermine professional equity or the principles of free academic exchange.
- Prejudicial actions or comments related to gender, gender identity, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, ability, socioeconomic status, age, or religion.
- Unwelcome solicitation of emotional or physical intimacy.
- Deliberate intimidation, stalking or following.
- Harassing photography or recording.
- Other intentionally disruptive behavior.

How to Submit a Grievance or Complaint to the NPSA

If harassment is observed, please report it to any NPSA staff member, Officer, or General Council Member. If there is a question of immediate physical danger, action should be taken immediately to ensure the safety of all attendees and staff, regardless of any complaint procedure that needs to be followed.

Participants who believe that they have experienced or witnessed harassment or have been the target of unprofessional conduct in violation of NPSA's Anti-Harassment Policy and Professional Code of Conduct can submit a complaint to Ethics@northeasternpsa.com.

Individuals should be prepared to provide the NPSA with as much detail and documentation as possible (preferably in writing). The NPSA will treat reports as confidential to the extent possible to allow the NPSA to assess the incident.

Upon receiving a complaint, the NPSA President and Executive Director will refer the complaint to an Ad Hoc Complaint Committee (recusing any individuals from the Complaint Committee with a prior relationship to any party involved).

The Complaint Committee will conduct an appropriate investigation, which may include interviewing all parties and any witnesses to the incident, as well as reviewing all relevant documentation. The Complaint Committee may consult legal counsel or refer matters to the appropriate authorities where criminal or civil remedies may be warranted. The Committee will write a brief preliminary report stating its findings and determination and the factual basis of its decision. The Committee will provide the respondent and complainant with thirty days to respond to the preliminary report in writing prior to submitting to the NPSA Executive Board a final report and any recommended sanctions.

When an individual is found to have engaged in inappropriate conduct under this policy, possible sanctions may include:

- Issuing a warning to cease the discriminatory or harassing behavior and retaining a record of that warning in case of future violations.
- Terminating current NPSA conference participation and any NPSA responsibilities or appointments held.
- Barring the person from assuming any future governance positions within NPSA.
- Barring the person from participating in future NPSA conferences or events; and/or
- Revoking NPSA Membership.

The NPSA Executive Board will vote on the actions recommended by the Committee and will notify all parties of the relevant decisions.

Guidelines For Panel Participation

Time Allotments: Each panel period is scheduled for approximately one hour and thirty minutes. During the panel session, the presentation of each paper should take no more than fifteen minutes. Discussants and responses from authors should take no more than a total of fifteen minutes. A minimum of fifteen minutes should be allotted for audience participation.

Role of Chair: At the meeting, panel chairs should provide a brief introduction of participants; and a brief overview of the panel (for instance, common themes). Chairs should act to move proceedings along and recognize questions from the floor. The panel chair should be firm in limiting excessively talkative participants.

Paper Copy. If the panel chair does not receive a copy of the participant's paper by the set deadline, then s/he should contact the author to request copies for all panel participants.

Replacements. Panel chairs should recruit replacements for discussants who withdraw from participation.

Communication. Please keep the section and program chairs informed of all panel changes as soon as possible in order that the printed program may be as accurate as possible.

Role of Discussants. Discussants should address the significance of any substantive problems with the papers during the panel. Try to limit remarks to no more than three or four major points in a single paper. Stylistic critique is useful and generally appreciated by the authors but should be communicated outside the panel by marginal or separate notes and conversation. Further, discussants' comments should be courteous and constructive even when critical of papers.

Role of Authors. Paper authors are expected, as courteous and responsible professionals, to complete their papers and send their copies by the set deadline to the other members of the panel, including the panel chair, the discussants, and the other authors on the panel.

Do Not Read the Paper. Paper authors should prepare complete, written papers, but during the panel they should only present findings and significance rather than read the paper.

Bring Copies. Paper authors are encouraged to bring printed copies of their papers for distribution to members of the audience. Also, it would be very useful in adding to the professionalism of the conference if each paper would provide copies for the exhibition area for interested conference participants.

Awards. Panel chairs should forward to their section chair papers to be considered for the one of the awards in either the faculty or graduate student categories.

Withdrawals. If a panelist must withdraw from participation, he/she should inform the panel chair and the program chair as soon as possible. There are often other persons who proposed papers or who wish to act as discussants but could not be included in the program because of the limited number and size of the panels. A current non-participant might be able to fill the vacancy. Unjustified no-shows might lead to a prohibition to participate in future conferences.

Pre-registration. All participants should pre-register by the deadline indicated in the Call for Participation to ensure that their names will be printed in the Final Program and to take advantage of fee discounts.

Projection Technology at the Conference. Unfortunately, there will be no computer projection technology available at this conference. Plan on making your presentation the traditional way: with no PowerPoint slides. However, you may, instead, distribute printed copies of your slides to the audience (approximately 10 or 15 copies). Sharing complete printed papers is also good.



Mark Warren

University of British Columbia APSA President, 2023-2024

Mark E. Warren is Professor Emeritus of Political Science at the University of British Columbia, where he held the Harold and Dorrie Merilees Chair for the Study of Democracy. Warren's research focuses on contemporary democratic theory and democratic innovations, including a project entitled *Participedia* (www.participedia.net), which uses a web-based platform to collect information about democratic innovations around the world. He is currently President of the American Political Science Association.

Pi Sigma Alpha Lecture

Thomas E. Patterson

Harvard University

Thomas E. Patterson is Bradlee Professor of Government and the Press. In the past, he has authored three books, *Informing the News: The Need for Knowledge-Based Journalism; How America Lost Its Mind: The Assault on*

Reason That's Crippling Our Democracy, and Is the Republican Party Destroying Itself?. An earlier book, The Vanishing Voter, examined electoral participation, and his book on the media's political role, Out of Order, received the American Political Science Association's Graber Award as the best book of the decade in political communication. His first book, The Unseeing Eye, was named by the American Association for Public Opinion Research as one of the 50 most influential books on public opinion in the past half century. He is also the author of Mass Media Election: How Americans Choose Their President (1980), and an introductory American government text We the People, which is now in its 14th edition.. His articles have appeared in *Political* Communication, Journal of Communication, Public Opinion Quarterly, and other academic journals, as well as in the popular press. His research has been funded by the Ford, Markle, Smith-Richardson, Pew, Knight, Carnegie, and National Science foundations. Patterson received his PhD from the University of Minnesota in 1971.
